Ross is also involved in industry bodies having been a board member of the Nursery and Garden Industry QLD (NGIQ) Gold Coast branch since 2001 and serving as president of the branch for two years from 2006. He is currently a board member of the management committee of NGIQ.

He has been a role model and industry champion, attaining accreditation and

Ecohort certification and encouraging other nurseries to do the same.

"We involve ourselves in our industry bodies because it's good to give back to an industry that's given us so much," Ross says.

Immediately after the Annual General Meeting in Brisbane, NGIA CEO Robert Prince and I visited nurseries in Far North Queensland to gain an understanding of some of the issues facing businesses in an area where the major customer base is over 600km away and unemployment is running at over 14%.

New National Marketing Committee

The National Marketing Committee has been restructured and NGIA would like to welcome four new members to the committee; Gary Spink of Marlborough Nursery (QLD) Matt de Ville of Oasis (NSW), John Van der Horst of Acorn Nursery (VIC), and NGIA Board Member Geoff Richards of Richgro (WA). Judy Horton of Yates (NSW) remains on the committee.

Industry Training Package update

The industry continues to discuss with AgriFood Skills Australia (AFISC) our requirement for specialised streams for Production and Retail qualifications in the national VET training package.

Negotiations are continuing with AFISC regarding the need to include specialised Certificate II, III, IV and diploma level qualifications for both Retail and Production Nursery.

Work was completed by NGIA on behalf of industry, and submitted to AFISC in July 2008, requesting these specialised qualifications and also included a list of mandatory industry subjects. This request (as of November 23) is yet to be confirmed by AFISC.

Currently AFISC feedback advises that low enrolment numbers for some qualifications (including Retail and Production Nursery) over the past few years indicate no requirement to spend time on the design of specialised qualifications in these areas.

The industry, via NGIA, has spent much time and effort over the past 12 months on the promotion of careers for our sector through the Green-Life Careers project and other related promotional campaigns.

It is our belief that to exclude the Production and Retail specialised streams from the ACH10 national training package (containing mandatory units) would be detrimental to the future of our industry. Qualifications containing mandatory units applicable to the production and retail sectors will assist in the industry's effort to stop the 'watering down' of graduate's skills and knowledge as reported by industry employers over the past few years.
